<b>Brief Description of cultural element</b>	
Milk products are important for the economy and they are a tangible form of cultural heritage. Yoghurt and butter are an important part of the local food production.

Strainer and jug	
<b>How is it used?</b>	This tool is used to shake the milk and to retrieve the butter. It is usually used in the Spring time and mainly for domestic use.
<b>Distribution:</b>	Across Palestine and especially Bedouin communities
<b>The story of the presentation</b>	
When I was young I would watch how my friends' mother would produce yoghurt and butter. I would watch and listen as she explained to my friend how important it was to know this in order to get married. My mother cared about me and was concerned about my future and so she would talk to me about the importance of learning this skill in order to be accepted as part of my husbands family and to avoid being mocked at.	
<b>How has this cultural heritage been transmitted to the next generation</b>	
Through documentation, interviews and workshops. Through discussing the process of making milk products, this product will continue to be used in the future.	
<b>Risk elements</b>	
A lack of interest in history and traditional heritage along with a shortage of documentation. When the information surrounding its usage isn't passed from the older generation.	
<b>Documentary evidence (ie. Interviews, video, photos)</b>	
Interviews, photos and a video recordings.
